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Updated Statutory Language: Advisory Letter

An advisory letter may be issued to a licensee or certificate holder when the Board determines that while there was insufficient evidence to establish a clear violation of the law, there was sufficient merit to the case such that the Board chose not to dismiss the complaint. An advisory letter formally notifies the recipient that his or her particular practices need to be modified or eliminated since the continuation of such practices may result in further and potentially more serious Board action. It also reminds the recipient that he or she may benefit from further education regarding physical therapy statutes and rules.

An advisory letter was formerly known as a letter of concern. The terminology was updated when the new statutes became effective on 8-25-04. What type of practice circumstances may lead to the issuance of an advisory letter? The following brief synopses are examples of recent complaints reviewed by the Board that resulted in the issuance of an advisory letter to the physical therapist or physical therapist assistant.

- A patient questioned her physical therapist about her Medicare bills, but the physical therapist did not take the time to sufficiently educate the patient about the complicated billing processes used by the licensee. Although the Board found the billing to be consistent and appropriate for the treatment provided, and no violation of statute or rule was found, the Board issued the therapist an advisory letter stating that the physical therapist should have been able to provide the patient with an explanation of the licensee's billing practices and of how Medicare was being billed.
- A patient called her physical therapist and asked for the number of her P.T. license. Sensing that the patient was upset, the physical therapist initially refused to provide this information, though eventually did inform the patient of the license number later that day. The Board felt that the physical therapist should have responded immediately to the patient's request for her license number per ARS 32-2051. Because the therapist eventually did give the patient her license number, rather than finding the therapist in violation of statute and disciplining the therapist, the Board voted to issue the physical therapist an advisory letter.
- A patient filed a complaint alleging that the physical therapy treatments for her knee were too vigorous and resulted in further injury to her knee. The patient also alleged that during the same time period, the physical therapist failed to initiate physician prescribed treatment for her neck and back. With regard to the first allegation, the Board determined that the knee rehabilitation provided by the physical therapist was appropriate and was not the proximate cause of the patient's increased pain and dysfunction complaints. Regarding the second allegation, after providing the physical therapist's front office with a prescription for physical therapy for her neck and back and having made an appointment, the patient came in to the clinic expecting an evaluation and treatment for her neck and back. HOW CAN www.ptboard.state.az.us HELP YOU?

The Board of Physical Therapy has developed a website to offer members of the public and the profession resources and information about the law, the board and board actions. The web pages consist of topics most frequently asked over the phone, in correspondence, or in person. Here is a quick guide to the pages you will find:

General Board Information - This includes who is serving on the Board, past meeting minutes and current meeting agenda. There is a link to all Substantive Policy Statements adopted by the Board.

AZ Physical Therapy Practice Act - This consists of pertinent sections from the Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) and the Arizona Administrative Code (A.A.C.).

Forms - This includes change of address form, request for a license verification, public records request form, change of

name form and compliant form, all in PDF format.

License applications - All pertinent licensure and certification requirements and applications.

Search of Active PT and PTA's - Verify the license or certificate of an active physical therapist or physical therapy assistant.

Continuing Education - You will find general information on the continuing competence requirements for renewal and a link to the administrative rules that describe the requirements.

Complaints and investigations - You will find information on the process taken once the Board receives a complaint or initiates an investigation. All of the pertinent forms are available in PDF format, such as the complaint form, authorization to release medical records, etc.

CHANGES TO THE PHYSICAL THERAPY LAW

Several technical and substantive changes were made to the Arizona Physical Therapy Practice Act that went into effect August 25, 2004. These changes were the result of the passage of Senate Bill 1098, introduced in the second regular session of the 46th Arizona State Legislature and sponsored by Senator Toni Hellon (District 26; Tucson). These changes are the product of several months of intensive review of the statutes by the Board, which included participation from members of the physical therapy profession and AzPTA. The changes to the statutes include:

- β Adding a definition for "interim permit holder" to support the existing statutory language [A.R.S. §32-2001];
- β Expanding the Board's authority under "Board Duties" with respect to continuing competence, (i.e. the Board shall "establish the mechanisms for assessing the continuing professional competence of physical therapists to engage in the practice of physical therapy and of physical therapist assistants to work in the field of physical therapy") [A.R.S. §32-2003];
- β Updating a number of statutes to clarify that physical therapist assistants are subject to many of the same regulatory requirements as are physical therapists;
- β Deleting the section addressing athletic trainers as exempted from licensure as physical therapists as they are now regulated under a separate state agency [A.R.S. §32-2021];
- β Requiring former licensees to demonstrate competence prior to reinstatement of the license when the license has lapsed for more than three years [A.R.S. §32-2028];
- β Adding new exemptions for licensure [A.R.S. §32-2021];
- β Physical therapists licensed in another U.S. jurisdiction care providing care in Arizona during a declared disaster or public emergency (limited to the duration of the emergency or 60 days,

whichever is lesser);

- β Physical therapists licensed in another U.S. jurisdiction providing physical therapy to a target population in Arizona for a limited period of time (e.g. traveling dance company or visiting athletic team for no more than 60 days);
- β Clarifying what is required of foreign educated physical therapists for licensure and what requirements may be waived by the Board [A.R.S. §32-2022(B)(E)];
- β Removing the requirement on the part of the Board to approve remediation plans for applicants who have failed the national examination two times or more [A.R.S. §32-2024];
- β Moving administrative rule language addressing patient care management (A.A.C. R4-24-303) into statute [A.R.S. §32-2043];
- β Clarifying supervision requirements on the part of physical therapists with respect to physical therapist assistants and other assistive personnel [A.R.S. §32-2043];
- β Changing all references to "informal interview" to "informal hearing" [A.R.S. §32-2046];
- β Changing "letters of concern" to "advisory letters" to better reflect the purpose of such letters [A.R.S. §32-2045(B)(2)];
- β Stipulating that a voluntary surrender of license or certificate can only be done with the approval of the Board [A.R.S. §32-2047(7)]; and
- β Other minor technical changes intended to clarify the statutes.

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therapist anticipated that the appointment was for treatment of her knee and refused to do the evaluation that day because of time constraints. The therapist did not speak to the patient directly about her rationale for this decision. Instead, a clinic assistant informed the patient that she would not be evaluated that day, and the patient left the clinic upset and angry. The Board did not find a violation of statute or rule, but did vote to issue the physical therapist an advisory letter. The Board's advisory letter suggested that the physical therapist improve communication with patients, and suggested establishing protocols for the scheduling of appointments including evaluation appointments.

- A complaint filed by a patient alleged that her physical therapist failed to provide information regarding therapy treatment interventions as well as anticipated outcomes of care. This compelled the patient to spend time and money consulting

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OTHER TITLE 32 STATUTES OF NOTE

All Arizona licensed physical therapists should be familiar with the set of laws found at Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) §32-2001 through §32-2052 as these statutes govern the practice of physical therapy in Arizona. However, there are additional statutes found in Title 32, Professions and Occupations, of which all licensed and certified persons should also be aware as they grant regulatory Boards additional authority to investigate and take action against those individuals they regulate. Following are three such statutes:

32-3203. Malpractice claim investigation

On receipt of a malpractice report and a copy of a malpractice complaint as provided in section 12-570, the health profession regulatory board shall initiate an investigation into the matter to determine if the licensee is in violation of the statutes or rules governing licensure

32-3208. Criminal charges; mandatory reporting requirements; civil penalty

A. A health professional who has been charged with a misdemeanor involving conduct that may affect patient safety or a felony after receiving or renewing a license or certificate must notify the health professional's regulatory board in writing within ten working days after the charge is filed.

B. An applicant for licensure or certification as a health professional who has been charged with a misdemeanor involving conduct that may affect patient safety or a felony after submitting the application must notify the regulatory board in writing within ten working days after the charge is filed.

C. On receipt of this information the regulatory board may conduct an investigation.

D. A health professional who does not comply with the noti-

fication requirements of this section commits an act of unprofessional conduct. The health professional's regulatory board may impose a civil penalty of not more than one thousand dollars in addition to other disciplinary action it takes.

E. The regulatory board may deny the application of an applicant who does not comply with the notification requirements of this section.

F. On request a health profession regulatory board shall provide an applicant or health professional with a list of misdemeanors that the applicant or health professional must report.

32-3701. Child support arrearages; suspension of license or certificate; applicability; definition

A. A licensing board or agency shall suspend a license within thirty days after receiving a certificate of noncompliance from the court pursuant to section 25-518. The licensing board or agency shall not lift the suspension until it receives a certificate of compliance from the court.

B. The licensing board or agency shall notify the department of economic security within thirty days in writing, or by any other means prescribed by the department, of all license suspensions pursuant to this section. The information shall include the person's name, address, date of birth and social security number.

C. This section applies to support obligations ordered by any state, territory or district of the United States.

D. For purposes of this section, "license" means any license, certificate, registration, permit or other authorization that:

1. Is issued by an agency or regulatory board.
2. Is subject before expiration to suspension, revocation, forfeiture or termination by the issuing board or agency.
3. A person must obtain to practice or engage in a particular business, occupation or profession.

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with other health care workers and a fitness instructor to get her questions answered. The Board's investigation supported the patient's allegations. Although the therapist did not violate statute or rule, the Board voted to issue the therapist an advisory letter as the Board determined that the therapist had a responsibility to educate the patient on physical therapy treatments and expected outcomes, and needed to take the time to provide this information to the patient.

- A physical therapist was using the following inappropriate professional designations: "M.P.T., L.L.C.". Per ARS 32-2042, the appropriate legal designation for a physical therapist is "P.T.". Because the Board was in the process of clarifying this statute with a substantive policy statement on use of titles, the Board issued the therapist an advisory letter and suggested that the physical therapist indicate professional designations in the following order: "P.T., M.P.T., L.L.C."

The Board issued six advisory letters in 2004. Though an advisory letter is non-disciplinary, it is a permanent document in a licensee or certificate holders file and may be referenced by the Board in any future disciplinary proceedings involving the licensee or certificate holder (ARS 32-2003). Statute does not require the Board to publish the names of those individuals who received an advisory letter, and therefore their names are not published in annual Board newsletter, or on the P.T. Board website.

SUBSTANTIVE POLICY STATEMENTS

The following Substantive Policy Statements have been adopted by the Board of PT to help clarify specific statutes for the profession and the public.

USE OF PROFESSIONAL TITLES OR DESIGNATIONS BY ARIZONA LICENSED PHYSICAL THERAPISTS

Pursuant to A.R.S. §32-2042, Use of titles; restrictions; violation; classification, a person licensed by the Arizona Board of Physical Therapy shall use the professional written designation "P.T." immediately following his or her name.

Following the "P.T." designation, licensees may list academic degrees (e.g. B.S., M.P.T., D.P.T., Ph.D.), and professional specialty certifications including but not limited to: Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Certified Specialist (CCS), Electrophysiologic Certified Specialist (ECS), Geriatric Certified Specialist (GCS), Neurologic Certified Specialist (NCS), Orthopaedic Certified Specialist (OCS), Pediatric Certified Specialist (PCS), Sports Certified Specialist (SCS), Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) and Certified Hand Therapist (CHT). These degrees and designations may not be listed in lieu of the designation of "P.T."

The designations "R.P.T." (Registered Physical Therapist) and "L.P.T." (Licensed Physical Therapist) are not recognized by the Arizona Revised Statutes, nor by the Arizona Board of Physical Therapy.

All other requirements of A.R.S. §32-2042 apply with respect to use of titles.

GRADUATES OF PHYSICAL THERAPIST EDUCATION PROGRAMS, NOT YET LICENSED, WORKING IN THE FIELD OF PHYSICAL THERAPY

Pursuant to A.R.S. §32-2043, Supervision; patient care management, graduates of physical therapist education programs who are not yet licensed or certified may engage in the practice of physical therapy on a limited basis.

Graduates of physical therapist education programs fall within the definition of "assistive personnel" at A.R.S. §32-2001(1), "includes physical therapist assistants and physical therapy aides and other assistive personnel who are trained or educated health care providers and who are not physical therapist assistants or physical therapy aides but who perform specific designated tasks related to physical therapy under the supervision of a physical therapist" (emphasis added). A.R.S. §32-2043 states that a physical therapist may delegate to assistive personnel and supervise selected acts, tasks or procedures that fall within the scope of physical therapy practice, but that do not exceed

the education or training of the assistive personnel. The acts, tasks and procedures that can be delegated to a graduate must be commensurate with the education and training that the graduate received in the graduate's physical therapist education program, with exceptions. The supervising physical therapist determines what acts, tasks and procedures will be delegated to assistive personnel, including graduates, in accordance with A.R.S. §32-2043(A).

A.R.S. §32-2043(F) states "a physical therapist is responsible for managing all aspects of the physical therapy care of each patient. A physical therapist must provide: 1) the initial evaluation and documentation for a patient; 2) periodic reevaluation and documentation of a patient; 3) the documented discharge of a patient . . .". A physical therapist is defined at A.R.S. §32-2001(6) as "a person who is licensed pursuant to this chapter". A graduate is therefore precluded from performing any of the tasks identified in A.R.S. §32-2043(F).

The statutes do not allow a graduate of a physical therapist education program who is not yet licensed as a physical therapist to supervise physical therapy assistive personnel. A.R.S. §32-2043(A) states that a only a physical therapist may delegate selected acts, tasks or procedures to assistive personnel.

The statutes do not recognize the designation "SPT" which is commonly used by physical therapist students during the students' clinical internships. Pursuant to A.R.S. §32-2042, Use of titles, graduates may not use the designation of "PT", "MPT", nor "DPT". Graduates must designate the graduate's employment status as assistive personnel in any documentation. Any notes recorded by a graduate must be co-signed by the supervising physical therapist.

According to A.R.S. §32-2043(G), prior to delegating any tasks a physical therapist must verify the qualifications of physical therapist assistants and other assistive personnel under the physical therapist's direction and supervision. Additionally, A.R.S. §32-2043(H) requires the physical therapist to also determine on each date of service whether treatment for that date requires the expertise of the licensed physical therapist and whether it is appropriate to delegate those activities to the assistive personnel, as well as the basis for the determination of delegation of a particular act, task or procedure as appropriate for that assistive personnel to undertake with a particular patient on a particular date of service.

JURISPRUDENCE EXAM DEVELOPMENT 2005

In the Fall of 2004, the Arizona Board of Physical Therapy launched an important initiative aimed at better ensuring that applicants for initial licensure would demonstrate competency with respect to knowledge of the law that governs physical therapy practice in Arizona. The Board partnered with the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) to develop a Jurisprudence Examination on which all applicants must achieve a passing score as a qualification for licensure or certification. The Jurisprudence Examination will become a requirement for anyone making application after October 1, 2005. The examination is comes entirely from the content of the Board's statutes (A.R.S. §32-2001 et seq.) and the Administrative rules (Title 4, Chapter 24, Articles 1 through 5).

FSBPT is the organization that currently develops and administers the National Physical Therapy Examination (NPTE) for all 53 United States jurisdictions (50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands). Given the expertise of FSBPT staff with respect to developing, maintaining, delivering, scoring and maintaining statistics for a high-stakes examination, the organization was an ideal partner for this endeavor. The Board originally sought – and was granted – statutory change to A.R.S. §32-2022 in 2003 in order to require a jurisprudence examination as a qualification for licensure and for certification. In 2004 the Board was granted a special appropriation by the Arizona State Legislature of \$5,000 (from its own fund) to finance the cost of the development effort. FSBPT pledged the support of its staff and technology resources, while the Board covered the costs associated with travel for the volunteers. It was the time and expertise of the volunteers, under the guidance and direction of FSBPT staff, that enabled the finished product—two examination forms—to

come into fruition. The Item Writers wrote the examination questions during a two-day workshop after a brief training session on proper item writing protocols. The Item Reviewers, who were tapped for their high level of knowledge of the Board's statutes and rules, edited the items. Finally, the Pass Point Judges assigned a passing rate to every item. A list of those volunteers and the committees on which they served follows this article. The Board is immeasurably grateful for their efforts.

Candidates will have one hour with which to complete the 50-question examination; 40 items (questions) will count toward a candidate's score, while the remaining 10 items are designated as "pre-test items" that are essentially tested for inclusion on the examination in the future. The preparatory materials for the Jurisprudence Examination will strongly encourage candidates to study the Board's statutes and rules as the examination is difficult enough that anyone taking it without preparing will likely fail.

The statistics that FSBPT will maintain relative to the examination scores will provide the Board with a great deal of information concerning how well prepared licensure and certification applicants are with respect to Arizona law governing the practice of physical therapy. The purpose of requiring a passing score on the examination is to provide better assurance to the public that anyone granted a license or a certificate by the Arizona Board of Physical Therapy possesses at least entry-level competence and comprehension of the law.

PASS POINT JUDGES
